
FALL INSPIRATION

CONTAINER STYLE

One Container, Four Seasons

Want a container with year-around beauty and seasonal flexibility that will get attention in your neighborhood? You can have it when you choose a slow-growing vertical shrub, like North Pole™ Arborvitae, shown here, and change out your annual underplantings to match the season. Or double the attention by flanking your front door or garage entrance with a pair of the same containers. Just follow these step-by-step instructions.

W I N T E R

1. Select a container that is impervious to water, such as glazed pottery or concrete. Do not use terra cotta. Be sure the container you choose has a drainage hole or drill one yourself.
2. Purchase a columnar shrub, sized to your container yet small enough to allow for underplanting. Good options include SUNJOY® Gold Pillar *Berberis*, SKY POINTER™ *Ilex*, FINE LINE® *Rhamnus*, and the Proven Winners line of *Arborvitae*.
3. Fill your container with a good potting soil and plant the shrub in the center (if your container will be against a wall, plant the shrub in the rear center).
4. Underplant the shrub by the season.

For early spring – Plant after danger of freezing is past using cold-hardy plants like bellis, primula, heuchera, aquilegia, erysimum, or euphorbias.

For summer – Use filler and spiller plants to underplant, keeping in mind the amount of sun at the container's location.

For fall – Trim and fertilize the summer plants or replace them with plants that flourish when the weather gets cooler, like Supertunia®, Superbells®, or Superbenas®.

For winter – In late fall, remove the underplantings and cover the surface of the soil around the shrub with river rock or moss. Decorate with lights and outdoor ribbon for the holidays.



Mark McDougal

As a child, Mark grew up roaming the 33 acres of grounds within the Grand Tradition property in southern California, learning at the hip of his grandmother and grandfather who developed the estate. In the family tradition, “everybody takes their turn” learning from doing in each department of this family business. Mark worked in food service, wedding planning, special events detail, maintenance, and groundskeeping. Mark’s artistic eye has guided the design of the property’s new gardens, including the creation of massive rock waterfalls and water features and then landscaping that completes his vision. He explains that Grand Tradition’s recent partnership with Proven Winners ensures that these new gardens feature plants with “incredible longevity.”

ASK THE EXPERT

PROVEN BEAUTY: Which of your garden tools has the most significance to you?

MARK McDUGAL: My Grandpa Mac started Grand Tradition, and one of my earliest memories is walking the grounds with him. He always carried his pruners in a little handmade leather holder. They hang in my workspace now as a reminder to always honor his intentions as I move Grand Tradition into the future.

PB: What gives you inspiration for your garden designs?

MM: When designing a new planting area of our gardens, I try to think like a painter. The plants are my paints, and my trowel is my brush. Sometimes I sketch my idea and shade it with pastel chalks to make sure I’ve got everything in balance and there’s visual harmony.


PB: What tips do you have for gardeners who have a much smaller area to work with?

MM: Make note of your emotional reaction to colors and the way they affect you when used together. Does red make you energetic? Does pink calm you? Does yellow make you happy? Is white more interesting when used with grey or dark foliage? Developing a base color palette that you like to live with is the first step. Once the base color palette has been identified, I use a color wheel to work out color combinations that are easy on the eye. It’s also a helpful tool when we want to add a new pop of color emphasis. Not all colors play nicely together.

PB: What do you look for when choosing plants for your designs?

MM: Points of interest with pleasing foreground and background companion plants. We have a wide variety of thematic gardens that range from formal to densely tropical to Mediterranean, and in each area, I am careful to choose plants that don’t fight each other for attention. Again, they have to play well together. Over time, you learn how to stage properly so that one plant will not overwhelm and overpower the other. I encourage home gardeners to ask the advice of the nursery folks who work with these plants every day.

COBRA-HEADED WEEEDER

Broad-brimmed, cheap straw gardening hats are especially important in the intensity of the southern California sun, but they're a necessity no matter where you live so you can enjoy gardening while protecting your skin.

A 36-inch probe moisture meter is essential for our large landscape. It measures moisture levels and tells us instantly whether our garden needs water.

The long-handled version of this cobra-headed weeder is indispensable for our grounds crew.



DRIED AND TRUE

ENJOY YOUR HYDRANGEA FOR MONTHS TO COME

The big, beautiful blooms of hydrangea enhance the landscape during the growing season. They also make lovely dried arrangements, so you can enjoy them long after you say goodbye to the days of summer.

What's the secret to drying hydrangea successfully?

For best results, you need to cut the blooms at the right time, and that means waiting for them to shift colors and develop a papery texture. The harvest time will be different depending on the variety of hydrangea in your garden. For instance, QUICK FIRE®, the hydrangea shown on the opposite page, blooms in June, while others, like 'Limelight' shown above, don't flower until early August. In both cases, it's best to harvest the flowers about a month or so after the initial blooms appear to create the best and most long-lasting dried arrangements.

You can enhance the color of the blooms by spraying the florets with a matching color immediately after cutting. Spray them lightly; just a tint of color is best. As the paint dries, it absorbs into the florets for a natural look. For more ideas and helpful hints for successful drying, visit the link shown here.

CARVE OUT A NEW IDEA

With Pumpkins and Succulents

Looking for a unique decoration that features the fall's most popular produce but doesn't require carving? This issue's do-it-yourself project, the pumpkin pod, makes a festive centerpiece, fall accent, or hostess gift for a Thanksgiving celebration.

Here's what you need:

A wide pumpkin with a concave top

Moss

Dried seeds, pods, and flowers

Succulent cuttings (sedums and aeoniums are great choices)

Craft glue or glue gun (hot glue provides a sturdier decoration and allows you to work more quickly)

Follow these steps to create your pumpkin pod:

1. Remove any stem from the top of the pumpkin.
2. Pat down the moss to make it about $\frac{1}{2}$ " thick.
3. Glue the moss to the top of the pumpkin.
4. Arrange your succulents and dried items atop the moss to create your design.
5. Glue the pieces to the moss, starting with the larger cuttings and filling in with smaller items.
6. Display on your table.
7. For best results, mist with water once a week and keep indoors. If you choose to display outdoors, place in the shade.

HARVEST A REMEDY FOR YOUR WINTER COLD

Be prepared for the cold and flu season with a natural remedy that you can gather from your own garden. Echinacea is widely recognized for its ability to boost the immune system and to shorten the duration and symptoms of the common cold.

Fall is the time to harvest echinacea roots, after the first frost and when the plant is dry and brown. And you can readily find this plant growing across the country. *Echinacea purpurea*, or purple coneflower, shown here, is a native prairie plant and is the same type sold as a natural supplement.

LITTLE HANDS * BIG IDEAS

Turn Over a New Leaf

While children enjoy collecting the colorful leaves of fall, they can also make their own. All you need to help them turn over their own new leaf is a spray bottle filled with water, some coffee filters, and paint. You can choose watercolors, acrylic paints, or india ink depending on the child's age and abilities. Then follow the directions shown below.

1. Gather your supplies and cover your work surface with newspaper or a plastic cloth.
2. Spray the coffee filters with water, and paint with fall colors. Either ball them up for a tie-dyed effect, as shown here, or lay flat.
3. Let dry. If balled up, unfold completely and lay flat. Fold in half and then into thirds. Cut almond-shaped leaves from the folded filters.
4. Encourage your child to decorate with their leaves. Tape to windows, display on the refrigerator, or try some of the projects shown in the links on the right.


